Macbeth Fact Sheet

The Shakespearean Tragedy

- 1. The drama gives the audience an emotional feeling of catharsis (cleansing of one's emotions).
- 2. The hero <u>protagonist</u> is a person of nobility (high rank) whose fate influences the destiny of his country or family.
- 3. The protagonist must make a moral decision that influences the outcome of the drama.
- 4. The hero is always an extraordinary man. When he is evil, however, he has compensating traits, such as strength, courage or ambition.
- 5. The hero/person of nobility has a tragic flaw (serious fault in character).
- 6. The serious fault in this hero/person of nobility leads to downfall, destruction and death (Act V Catastrophe).
- 7. Although the tragic hero has pulled his flawed world down on his head, there is another character who will restore order to the chaotic ruin (chaos).
- 8. The elements of a Shakespearean tragedy are:
 - a. The Supernatural
 - b. Abnormal Psychological States
 - c. Use of Coincidence

Note: These elements lead to a Gothic atmosphere and a sense of fate toward tragedy.

- 9. The inciting force is when something happens to initiate the action of the play.
- 10. The active force makes the protagonist feel as if he/she has the upper hand.
- 11. During the climax, the hero reaches the peak of his power.
- 12. The <u>moment of final</u> suspense is significant as the hero believes that things seem to be going his away again and that he will be safe from harm.

William Shakespeare

- 13. William Shakespeare (the Bard) was born April 23, 1564 and died on April 23, 1616.
- 14. He was born at **Stratford** upon Avon.
- 15. His mother, Mary, and father, John were both illiterates.
- 16. William Shakespeare was a voracious reader.
- 17. When William was 18 years old he was forced to marry Anne Hathaway.
- 18. He had three children: Susanna, Hamnet, and Judith.
- 19. His son, Hamnet, died at the age of 11 in 1596.
- 20. He attended King's new school.
- 21. His plays contain many geographical errors.
- 22. 18 of his plays were published in 1623. He wrote a total of 37 plays.
- 23. The breakdown of his plays was: 10 tragedies, 10 comedies, & 17 histories.
- 24. He wrote a total of 154 sonnets.
- 25. He introduced blank verse (iambic pentameter) to drama.
- 26. During Queen Elizabeth's reign, Shakespeare's company from 1594-1603 was called <u>Lord Chamberlain</u>'s men. After 1603 (King James the first), Shakespeare's company was called the <u>King</u>'s men.

Globe Theater

- 27. The Globe Theater was nicknamed the "Wooden-O."
- 28. The original Globe Theater burned down in 1613.
- 29. The Globe Theater had little scenery, was open to the sky, and had three sides for the audience.
- 30. All of the actors (players) were young boys and men.
- 31. Shakespeare's first production at the globe theater was Julius Caesar.
- 32. The Globe Theater accommodated more than 1500 people.
- 33. The "groundlings" sat in the pit.
- 34. A white flag signified that there would be a show that day.
- 35. On stage, a trap door leading to the "hell" area was where a winch elevator was located.
